- 1.1 Trace the etymology of significant terms used in political science and history. *

Structural Features of Information Materials

- 2.1 Analyze both the features and the rhetorical devices of different types of public documents and the way in which authors use those features and devices. * HSEE

3.0 LITERARY RESPONSE AND ANALYSIS

Structural Features of Literature

- 3.1 Analyze characteristics of subgenres (e.g., satire parody, allegory, pastoral) that are used in poetry, prose, plays, novels, short stories, essays and other basic genres. *

Narrative Analysis of Grade-Level –Appropriate Text

- 3.2 Analyze the way in which the theme or meaning of a selection represents a view or comment on life, using textual evidence to support the claim. * HSEE
- 3.3 Analyze the ways in which irony, tone, mood, the author's style, and the "sound" of language achieve specific rhetorical or aesthetic purposes or both. *
- 3.4 Analyze ways in which poets use imagery, personification, figures of speech, and sounds to evoke readers' emotions. * HSEE
- 3.5 Analyze recognized works of American literature representing a variety of genres and traditions:
 - a. Trace the development of American literature from the colonial period forward. HSEE
 - b. Contrast the major periods, themes, styles, and trends and describe how works by members of different cultures relate to one another each period.
 - c. Evaluate the philosophical, political, religious, ethical, and social influences of the historical period that shaped the characters, plots, and settings.
- 3.6 Analyze the way in which authors through the centuries have used archetypes drawn from myth and tradition in literature, film, political and religious writings. *
- 3.7 Analyze recognized works of world literature from a variety of authors:
 - a. Contrast the major literary forms, techniques, and characteristics of the major literary periods. * HSEE
 - b. Relate literary works and authors to the major themes and issues of their eras. *
 - c. Evaluate the philosophical, political, religious, ethical, and social influences of the historical periods that shaped the characters, plots, and settings.

- 3.8 Analyze the clarity and consistency of political assumptions in a selection of literary works or essays on a topic. (Political approach) HSEE

1.0 WRITING STRATEGIES

Organization and Focus

- 1.1 Demonstrate an understanding of the elements of discourse when completing narrative, expository, persuasive or descriptive writing assignments. * **HSEE**
- 1.2 Use point of view, characterization, style, and related elements for specific rhetorical and aesthetic purposes. *
- 1.3 Structure ideas and arguments in a sustained, persuasive, and sophisticated way and support them with precise and relevant examples. * **HSEE**

2.0 WRITING APPLICATIONS (GENRES AND THEIR CHARACTERISTICS)

- 2.1 Write fictional, autobiographical, or biographical narratives:
 - a. Narrate a sequence of events and communicate their significance to the audience. **HSEE**
 - b. Locate scenes and incidents in specific places. **HSEE**
 - c. Describe with concrete sensory details the sights, sounds, and smells of a scene and the specific actions, movements, gestures, and feelings of the characters; use interior monologue to depict the characters' feelings. **HSEE**
 - d. Pace the presentation of actions to accommodate temporal, spatial, and dramatic mood changes. **HSEE**
 - e. Make effective use of descriptions of appearance, images, shifting perspectives, and sensory details. **HSEE**
- 2.2 Write responses to literature:
 - a. Demonstrate a comprehensive understanding of the significant ideas in works or passages. **HSEE**
 - b. Analyze the use of imagery, language, universal themes, and unique aspects of the text. **HSEE**
 - c. Support important ideas and viewpoints through accurate and detailed references to the text and to other works. **HSEE**
 - d. Demonstrate an understanding of the author's use of stylistic devices and an appreciation of the effects created. **HSEE**
 - e. Identify and assess the impact of perceived ambiguities, nuances, and complexities within the text.
- 2.3 Write reflective compositions:
 - a. Explore the significance of personal experiences, events, conditions, or concerns by using rhetorical strategies (e.g. narration, description, exposition, persuasion).
 - b. Draw comparisons between specific incidents and broader themes that illustrate the writer's important beliefs or generalizations about life.
 - c. Maintain balance in describing individual incidents and relate those incidents to more general and abstract ideas.
- 2.4 Write historical investigation reports:
 - a. Use exposition, narration, description, argumentation, exposition, or some combination of rhetorical strategies to support the main proposition.
 - b. Analyze several historical records of a single event, examining critical relationships between elements of the research topic.
 - c. Explain the perceived reason or reasons for the similarities and differences in historical records with information derived from primary and secondary sources to support or enhance the presentation.
 - d. Include information from all relevant perspectives and take into consideration the validity and reliability of sources.
 - e. Include a formal bibliography.
- 2.5 Write job applications and resumes:
 - a. Provide clear and purposeful information and address the intended audience appropriately. **HSEE**
 - b. Use varied levels, patterns, and types of language to achieve intended effects and aid comprehension.
 - c. Modify the tone to fit the purpose and audience.
 - d. Follow the conventional style for that type of document and use page formats, fonts, and spacing that contribute to the readability and impact of the document.
- 2.6 Deliver multimedia presentations:
 - a. Combine text, images and sound and draw information from many sources.
 - b. Select an appropriate medium for each element of the presentation.
 - c. Use the selected media skillfully, editing appropriately and monitoring for quality.
 - d. Test their audience's response and revise the presentation accordingly.
