While most students only have to worry about tests and homework they have for core classes, a select group of senior and junior students have independently decided to take on an

extracurricular activity that involves an extra amount of studying. These are the dedicated students in the Orange County Decath-Academic lon (OCAD), a local branch of the national United States Academic Decathlon (USAD).

literature, art, music,

math, economics, interview, speech, impromptu speech, essay and super quiz. The dedicated members of OCAD take time out of their daily schedules to study for these subjects at home. A number of teachers give the OCAD students help with their studies from 4 to 5 p.m. everyday. Mrs. Jamie Jauch covers the subject of literature, Mrs. Danielle Connor assists with speech and interview, Dr. Samuel Myovich helps the students with their art and history, Mrs. Mindi Foote covers math and music and Mr. Fred Jenkins, OCAD coach, teaches economics.

All participating Orange County schools compete by taking multiple choice exams for each subject, besides speech, interview and super

The total possible multiple choice score for each person is 10,000 points. During the super quiz, students from competing schools are asked questions in front of a crowd of spectators. The participants answer the questions on-the-spot and a card is held up for the team with the correct answer. It is the only aspect of OCAD with an audience factor.

Within OCAD there are three categories, including Honors, Varsity

and Scholastic. Each student's school grade point average (GPA) determines which category they are placed in.
