STATE BUDGET CRISIS IMPACT (**ALIFORNIA SCHOOLS**

As the budget crisis in the state of California worsens, the number of Reduction in Force (RIF) notices sent out to teachers each year heightens. RIF notices inform teachers that their services may no longer be needed in the next school year.

The RIF situation is more complicated than it appears at first glance, Mr. Jim Bell, principal of Valencia High School, explains. For the first year after they are hired, teachers have temporary status. These "temps" can be released after one year of teaching, with no RIF notice needed. However, during their second year of teaching, teachers receive probationary status, and their third year, they become permanent, or tenured.

Probationary and tenured teachers require RIF notices before they can be let go for the coming year. By state law, teachers must be notified via RIF notice by March 15 if their job is in jeopardy, and they must sign a paper saying that they received their RIF notice. However, receiving a RIF notice is not

the end of the road for most teachers.

RIF notices can be rescinded, depending on the budget scenario at the end of the school year. "I would estimate that over half the teachers on campus have probably been RIFed at some point in their teaching career," stipulates Bell.

With the current budget situation, Governor Jerry Brown is attempting to put in place a car license tax extension, to continue currently implemented tax increases for another five years.

extension, passed, would be the best case scenario to save the public education system.

Even if the tax is extended, the school district will still have to cut an estimated \$7.5 million next year, most likely through furlough days. In this scenario, most teachers would have their RIF notices rescinded. However, if the tax extension **M**

does not pass, over \$15.5 million will have to be cut from the school district budget, in which case the majority of the RIF notices will not be rescinded.

These budget cuts will be districtwide, explains Bell, and will probably affect our school less than others in the district. Because Valencia is the largest school in the district, and there are fewer younger teachers on campus, it won't be as greatly impacted,

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
1st, 2nd, 3rd dimension and So 4th

On April 30, 2011, Valencia's drama students will be at Fullerton Union High School, which is located at 201 E. Chapman Ave, Fullerton, CA 92832, for the Drama Teacher Association of Southern California's (DTASC) Shakespeare festival.

Each year DTASC hosts a Fall Festival

competition and a Spring Shakespeare competition. Different schools host each year, and Valencia has hosted twice.

The competition has such events as audition mono-Shakelogue, speare's Families, Shakespeare Humor, Shakespeare CSI, Shakespeare the Musical, a scene from King

Lear, and a scene from Much Ado about Nothing. These events were chosen during a June meeting by the drama teachers involved.

The group drama event involves three to six participants selecting and performing a serious scene from King Lear. There is a time limit of eight minutes.

The group comedy event is similar, but involves a comedic scene from Ado about Nothing instead.

For the audition monologue, each participant has five minutes to perform two contrasting monologues to show their acting versatility. Each school can enter two students. The monologues must come from Shakespeare, and the featured plays may be used. Actors are allowed no more than two chairs as props.

In Shakespeare's Families, up to four actors perform a scene that demonstrates a family relationship. This scene may not come from the featured plays.

In Shakespeare Humor, two actors perform a humorous scene from Shakespeare. These

> scenes must be played straight; they are not parodies of the original. Again, these scenes may not come from King Lear or Much Ado Nothing. about In Shakespeare CSI, four actors perform a scene from Shakespeare

> involving murder. This scene may not come from the featured plays.

In Shake-

speare the Musical, up to ten actors perform a scene which may go for up to eight minutes. However, there's a twist. "[At any time] actors may break into any song of their choice at any time ala the film Moulin Rouge," said Grace Stanton, Drama teacher.

DTASC was founded in 1929 to further the cause of educational theatre by creating a network where teachers and students can show their skills and share ideas.
