The latest gadget from Apple appears to be indecisive and ambivalent, viewed to be something that will outdo itself. It can be quizzically viewed as a mutant of sorts: either an overlarge iPhone or a runt of a computer. However, despite the skepticism that many have generated, the iPad is surprisingly revolutionary.

This is not the first time that Apple has been faced with disdain and condescendence. The debut of the MacBook incited scoffs, criticized for its resemblance to a toy rather than a professional piece of equipment designed for business. In other more rational terms, the user is able to establish a greatly immersive and uninterrupted relationship with the device.

The iPad is gradually becoming renowned and praised for its build and display quality. The pristine LCD (liquid crystal display) screen makes it excellent for viewing videos, checking e-mail, and performing other such tasks. The strong aluminum back feels sturdy and smooth to the fingertips. Another structural advantage includes the thick bezel around the screen, which allows one's thumb or finger to grip the device without interfering with the touch surface. The battery life is a long and dependable ten or more hours.

Apple enthusiasts see the iPad as a symbolic new beacon. It is prospected to change education, publishing (possibly usurping the Amazon's Kindle), and gaming. Apple is not always the innovator of entirely new things-it revolutionizes existent devices and redefines their standards. Although the iPad is not yet wholly refined and perfected, it still introduces a new way of approaching the personal computer. The potential of the iPad is unimaginable. But this tablet is not only for dreamers of the future.

It can be considerably enjoyed in the present by certain types who enjoy casual usage of the computer, which occupies a majority of users. For instance, it appeals to those who predominantly browse the Web, social network, stream videos, and listen to music as opposed to those who need the computer for strict business. The iPad expedites, facilitates, and simplifies these tasks. Although it is arguably awkwardly cumbersome, its smart design makes it relatively comfortable to handle. Therefore, it provides a different sense of portabilitymainly inside the home. Inside the house, it offers transportation with great comfort with its merely 1.5 pound weight and sleek structure (unlike the conventional laptop), while also functioning as eye candy with its generously sized screen (unlike the smartphone or iTouch). Despite its disadvantages, the iPad is both promising for the future and currently excellently functional.
