REVITALIZATION AT VALENCIA: CONSTRUCTION

By now, everybody has become aware of the construction work happening at Valencia, what with the

gaping holes where buildings used to be, the smell of asphalt, and the dust in the air. However, to many it still remains unclear: what exactly is being constructed, and how long will it take? There are four various construction projects around campus - renovation of the 500 building, a second modernization of Bradford Stadium, the construction of a new building, and improvements to the school entry.

Over the summer, the renovation of the 500 building (which houses the foreign language department and the drama department) took place. New air conditioning and lighting were installed, and new classroom interiors and windows were also

the restrooms at the end of the building are also being redone. The completion of this construction project is scheduled to be in the near future.

Bradford Stadium remodeling is also underway.

Artificial turf and a new track were installed last year, and the next phase of improvements includes removing and replacing the bleachers. One side of bleachers has already been removed and replaced, and construction on the west bleachers begins in December. We will also be getting a new concession stand, new restrooms, and a remodeled entryway, and

to make room for a new, two-story building with 17 classrooms (the 600 building). The drainage system has been changed, and additional dirt has been brought in to raise the building's elevation. The new building is being built in Manteca, California, and delivery and assembly should begin in October, so that the teachers can move in over winter break.

> Finally, the school entry and administration building will also be modernized, with the breezeway between the administration building and the counseling office being connected, adding square footage to the existing space. This project is forecasted to be finished by July 2011.

> Principal Bell is enthusiastic about the construction projects, saying, "In the past four months, there has been more construction than during any other comparable period in the 35 years I have been at Valencia. This construction

The career center can help you prepare for the transition out of high school and into college or the workforce. In addition, online assessments are available to guide you as you make decisions about your future. You can also make an appointment to see Ms. Susan Huynh, who is our college representative from Cal State Fullerton. SAT DATES AND INFORMATION

With summer at an end and the school year in full swing, SATs are just around the corner. The SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) is the nation's most widely used college admission test, and it is taken by over two million students every year. SAT scores are accepted by most colleges and universities for consideration with your application.

For those who wish to practice for their SATs, the PSAT is being offered here at Valencia on Saturday, October 16. Underclassmen can take the PSAT, but it is especially recommended for juniors who wish to qualify for the National Merit Scholarship Competition. The PSAT is a perfect way to experience the SAT before actually taking it.

score. The last chance to take the SAT for college admissions is December of your senior year. The cost of the SAT is \$47, and you can talk to your counselor about SAT Fee Waiver information. More information about the SAT can be found at www.collegeboard.com.

Guidance counselor Mr. Stanley, who has been an Admissions reader for UCLA for eight years, would like to reiterate that grades and the rigor of your academic program are more important than good SAT scores. He says, "Good standardized test scores are important but only to the degree that they support the students GPA and the rigor of their course study. A solid four year academic program with strong grades will always be more important than high SAT scores."

In addition to the SAT1, college bound students may wish to take SAT2 subject tests. SAT2 tests are only necessary for students applying to the University of California and some private universities. It is recommended that students take their SAT2 subject tests in May of their sophomore and junior vear, after their corresponding AP/IB tests. This year, the tests will be administered on May 7, 2011. Students who wish to take the SAT 2 Language Listening Tests will have to take them in November. Sophomores taking AP Biology, AP Physics, or AP Statistics should take the equivalent SAT2 subject test in May. Students who wish to take the Spanish, Chinese, or Korean Listening Tests must take them in November, because this is the only date the listening tests are offered. If you are unsure about how to sign up for the SAT, have questions about when you should take it, or need assistance with the SAT Fee Waiver, talk to your counselor. Study hard and good luck!



When you're ready to take your SAT, it is being offered at Valencia on multiple dates. You can take your SAT 1 on November 6 and December 4 of this year, and January 22, March 12, May 7, and June 4 of next year. The SAT tests the reading, writing and math skills that you have learned in school, and it gives both you and colleges a sense of how you'll be able to apply your thinking, writing and study skills required for college course work. Also, SAT scores are considered for your college admission, and your score may help you decide what college is right for you. Our counseling department rec-

ommends that students take the SAT twice in the spring of their junior year. This gives you three more chances to take it again in the fall of your senior year if you would like to improve your
